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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Priyadarshini Indira Gandhi Government College for Women, situated at the heart of Haryana, Jind, is affiliated to Chaduhary Ranbir Singh University, Jind. The college has been accredited with grade A+ in PRAYAAS and recognised as one of the colleges of excellence by the government of Haryana. It was established by the Government of Haryana with the noble objective of imparting higher education to women at a time when there was no other government college for women in the entire district. The college commenced its functioning from the academic year 2005 with the strength of 500 students and 10 faculty members offering degree in Arts and Commerce, in the P.G block's building of Government College Jind. Presently, it has the strength of almost 2811 students and 79 teaching faculty members. The college was shifted in its own building in 2012 which was inaugurated by former Chief-Minister of Haryana Honourable Sh.Bhupender Singh Hooda on 3 June, 2012. The area of college is almost 28123sq.metres.(4720sq metres. covered Ground Floor) 6.94 acres. The college has smart classrooms with Wi-Fi facility, library, a fully air conditioned auditorium, six science labs(physics, chemistry, botany, zoology), two Geography labs, one language lab and three Computer labs to facilitate teachers and the students with modern tools. The college currently offers B.A, B.A English Honours, B.A Geography Honours, B.Sc. Computer Science B.Sc. Non-Medical, B.Sc. Medical, BCA, B.Com and B.Com Honours. It also offers one year Computer course & E.V.S. it has strong ethics in pursuit of excellence. The college promotes all round development of students through a wide range of extracurricular activities. The students have won medals at district level, state level and university level in sports and cultural competitions. The college constitutes various committee such as women cell, legal cell, placement cell, Red Ribbon Club, Eco Club, Earn While You Learn etc which help in creating awareness among the students of their rights and duties, social ethics and to execute all schemes and plans of the government for the holistic growth of the girls.

Institutional Weakness

Although the government is taking the initiative to avail some special routes of public transport to the girls but still transport is a big problem for the girl students of rural vicinity.

- Hostel facility is not available for girls.
- Maintenance of building is a big problem as this task is under PWD authority.
- There is no language lab instructor.
- No facility of solar system.
- No facility of PG courses for girls.
- Home science and music are the basic subjects for girls but these subjects are not introduced in the college.
- Lack of value added courses.
- Transfer and deputation of teachers in mid-session is also a big problem for smooth teaching learning.
- Lack of Placement of the students

Institutional Opportunity

- Introduction of vocational education, agreement with the industry and introduction of value added courses to make the students skilled good human beings.
- ICT enabled class rooms need to be increased.
- The college has scope for introduction of various PG classes in the subjects of English, Geography and Commerce as there are Honours classes in the college in these subjects.
- To provide the hostel facility and college bus service.
- Study leave to the teacher to promote research.
- Research facility to the students.
- More community outreach programmes.
- Improve the communication skill of the students.
- MOUs can be signed to promote research.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Curricular Planning & Implementation

Since the inception of the college PIG Govt. College for Women Jind on dated 14/10/2005 to 2017-18 session the college implemented the curriculum of K.U.K but since 2017-18 session it has been following the curriculum of C.R.S.U Jind as it has been affiliated to the CRSU by the Govt. of Haryana. Some teachers of the college participate in curriculum planning as a member of various bodies of the University such as Academic council, cultural & sports council.

Academic Flexibility

As per the guidelines of DGHE Haryana there is a special focus on courses, curriculum. Infrastructure has also been upgraded to remain responsive to the changing needs of the students. The courses offered by the college presently are B.com, B.A, BCA, B.sc (Medical), B.sc (Non-Medical), B.sc (Computer Science) B.A English Honours. B.A Geography Honours. One year computer course (Compulsory) has been introduced to enhance the skill & a sense of employability among the students. In even semester course of Environmental Studies has also been introduced.

Curriculum Enrichment

The college provides counselling assistance to all the students for enhancing their intellectual, physical, spiritual & professional skill. In the core courses the curriculum incorporates cross-cutting issues of human values, gender, environment & sustainability. The College conduct various extracurricular activities for the enrichment of syllabi .The College facilitates the students with all facilities necessary for their growth and all around development. The facility of smart class rooms, well equipped science labs (physics, chemistry, Botany, zoology), Geo labs, language lab, partially digital library, smart multipurpose auditorium, sports facilities for indoor & outdoor games are also provided.

In order to enhance the creativity of the students the E- version of the annual college Magazine 'ANAHITA' has been released to develop an attitude of paperless work culture.

Feedback

As a learning organization, college received feedback from the alumni, parent & students, teacher to resolves the problems of the students for betterment.

The college evaluates the POS, PSO & Co every year. The syllabus has been completed with revision. A few students got top position in the university.

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Teaching-learning and Evaluation

As per the direction of DGHE Haryana and the norms of the university a transparent online admission process purely on merit and reservation policy of the state of Haryana is implemented. The cut off merit admission list always remains higher than other institutions in the district.

Teaching learning Process

In the beginning of the session an orientation or assembly is organized to make the new students familiar with the college infrastructure, curriculum & co-curricular activities of the college. Annual academic calendar including lesson plan & extension activities is formed and displayed for the convenience of the students. Keeping in view the holistic development of the students various students' centric participative, innovative, experimental & problem solving methodologies are used. The available E-resources smart class rooms, language lab, computer labs, science labs, computer Labs, smart multipurpose auditorium are fully utilized to make the teaching learning process more comprehensive, analytical interesting & effective.

Various activities such as seminar, science exhibition, Educational tours, quiz competitions and other activities are organized to enhance the creativity of the students. E-version of the college Magazine ANAHITA is released to promote the creativity of the students and to develop a paperless work culture.

In order to instil the spirit of discipline among the students the name of the long absentee students are struck off by sending the yellow and pink letter card to their parents and fine is also imposed on the absent students.

Teacher Profile & Quality

Our college is embellished with experienced and highly qualified staff against sanctioned post or workload. In order to enhance their professional skill all the teacher participate in professional development programs and also publish and presented papers in National and International journals/seminar/conferences.

Evaluation Process & Reforms

As per the guidelines of the university, appropriate assessment is incorporated into the learning process. The institution has an effective mechanism to redress the grievances.

Assessment is incorporated into the learning process to achieve the learning goals of the courses through class test, assignments, attendance percentage of the students. Continuous evaluation has been done periodically.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Faculty members of the college have published research papers in various UGC approved journals of National & International level and some teachers have also edited or authored books. A number of teachers have participated in summer school, winter school, workshops, orientations, refreshers short term training, programmes, seminars & conferences etc for grooming their professional skill. The college has also contributed in organising national symposium in collaboration with History Congress of Haryana. As per the direction of DGHE Haryana teachers are provided with duty leave & TA /DA by the university or college for professional development programs. The teachers are also provided with compensatory or Earned leave in lieu of work during holidays or vacation.

The students are motivated to garner research achievement through extension activities. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Institution enables healthy environment for teaching-learning process providing pollution free, safe & secure lush green campus in nearly 10 acres of land. The college has sufficient facilities for academic, cultural, sports & other activities including well furnished girls common room, class rooms, smart class rooms, well equipped two chemistry labs, two physics labs, two Botany labs, one zoology lab, one language lab, two Geog labs, two comp. Labs, one digital library and one big multipurpose smart auditorium.

Library equipped with smart facilities has the seating capacity of more than 150 readers in one time. There is a regular assessment of infrastructure to keep pace with the changing needs due to increase in number of students & introduction of new courses. The maintenance & up gradation of infrastructure is the responsibility of the PWD of the Govt. Of Haryana & the building maintenance committee of the college inform the PWD about the requirement time to time. The committee takes the student centric decisions to support inclusive infrastructure. In order to create on eco-friendly environment solid waste management system, rain harvesting system, vermin compost has been installed. The proposal for installation of solar system has been sent to the Dept. of Higher Education Haryana.

Student Support and Progression

The college is committed to excel in all sphere of students' life therefore every student who joins the college is extended academic, psychological, professional & financial assistance. Every year the college utilized the grants sanctioned to women cell, sports, placement cells, Earn While You Learn, IT, Red cross, N.S.S, Science exhibition, library etc for the holistic development of the students . The students with financial constraints are benefited by scholarship (SC&BC). Merit scholarship is also given to the meritorious students. Talented & needy students are financially facilitated through Earn while you learn scheme & a sense of employability is developed among the students.

Placement cell of the college organised various programmes & activities such as seminars, workshops, extension lecturers etc. A visit to job fair is arranged for the students & they are benefited by the visit. Some competitive books & magazines are also purchased for the students.

Women cell organised Various competitions, workshops, seminars & extension lectures of eminent personalities on gender issues, legal rights and duties, health & hygiene, personality development, status of women in the society are organised.

Legal cell of the college makes the girls aware about their legal rights & duties. The two units of N.S.S organised various programs, one day camp & special camp of seven days to develop the spirit of community service among the students & make them responsible citizen.

Electoral club , the Red Ribbon Club and YRC also organized competitions to aware the students about the diseases such as HIV/AIDS , voting rights etc.

The students participate in cultural & sport events at college level, inter college, university level, district, national level & their achievements are commendable at various levels. A number of committee (approximately70) have been constituted to assist the students and for the smooth work culture of the college. P.I.G. Govt. College for Women, Jind, affiliated to Chaudhary Ranbir Singh University, Jind follows the curriculum given by the university. The University provides the academic calendar. Based on the university academic calendar, our college prepares its own academic calendar. The academic calendar provides date of commencement of the academic session, duration of semester, period of internal assessment tests, final semester examinations etc. Subject-wise as well as teacher-wise time-table is prepared by the concerned Departments. To enhance academic excellence, a clear cut action plan involving time frame for completing the syllabi (Lesson Plan) is made available on college website and notice boards which is easily accessible to the students. Detailed Academic and extra-curricular activities are planned by each departments in advance. The date and theme of such activities are conveyed to the students. Sports and cultural Activities to be carried out in a semester are planned in advance by respective departments. Problems and suggestions of students are collected by class In-charges. At the onset of new session, Orientation Programme is organized in which time-table and other college activities viz. Cultural and Sports Activities, and the activities to be conducted by NSS, NCC, Women Cell, Red Ribbon Club, Legal Cell units of the college. Principal of the college holds review meeting of the respective departments regularly. For the procurement of new books, Journals and other teaching aids, the librarian gets the budget sanctioned well in advance. In the college, faculty and other staff maintain cordial relations with the students and are always available for the help of the students.

As per the university norms, the students are assessed through assignments, assignment tests, attendance and field work. In addition, students are encouraged for PowerPoint presentations, debates and declamations etc. Exhibitions/Classroom-Seminars/Extension Lectures/Debate and Declamation/Quiz Contest/Excursions are regular features in the college. The College provides all basic facilities including well equipped laboratories, well stocked and partially-digital library, multi-purpose Auditorium, Smart Class Rooms, Indoor and Outdoor sports facilities for the implementation of the curriculum effectively. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The college organized orientation program for the students at the commencement of new batch every year. The program would help students to get familiarized with the institution curricular, co-curricular activities, facilities, rules and regulations. Before the commencement of classes, the essential requirements of students are identified and addressed at the earliest by way of a strategic approach. The college assesses the learning levels of the students in two ways at the time of the commencement of the programme. Students enrolled in various disciplines are identified as slow and advanced learner on the basis of their marks and the test conducted by teachers. This helps to identify the slow learners and initiatives are taken by the teacher to bridge the gap between the slow learners and the advanced learners. The tutors of the respective classes extend valid support to the students.

To check the performance of the students, tests and assignments are given to the students and on the basis of their Performance and their attendance in the classroom they are given assessment marks which prove very helpful in checking their overall performance during the year.

Strategies adopted for slow learners

- To improve the academic performance of the slow learners, the presentation of advance learners on various topics has been conducted in the classrooms. This practice helps the struggling learners to improve subject knowledge.
- The teachers formulate clear and succinct learning goals for students. The teacher tries to bridge the gap between the advance learner and slow learner by revision and practise of the topics in which the slow learners are weak.
- The tests are taken and the mistakes committed by the students are discussed in the classroom so that they can improve their mistake.

The slow learners are taught the basic fundamental things of the subjects in simple language according to their level. The technique of revision is followed by teachers so that the things —rules, regulations, formulae etc may imprint in their brain and questions based on basics of the subject are frequently asked from them. The students who solve the problem speedily are admired and appreciated in front of all the students. This practise inspires slow learners to do better in the classroomand a spirit of competition develops among them.

Strategies Adopted for Advanced learner

- The best performers are identified on the basis of test, group discussion, internal assessment, university examination and participation in the classroom. They are advised to participate not only in curricular but also in co curricular activities to develop analytical and problem solving abilities to improve their presentation skill.
- Providing opportunities to develop their creativity by participating in inter college as well as national level activities.
- A healthy competitive spirit is inculcated among the advanced learners to get best rank in the university.

- Semester toppers and university rank holders are encouraged with certificate and cash prizes by college.
- Various activities are conducted by all the departments in respective areas to mould the students in corresponding field.

Learning process is accomplished with innovative experiments in well-equipped labs as two labs of Geography, Physics, chemistry, Computer Science, language lab and multipurpose auditorium. All these facilities play a major role in creating a better teaching and learning.

To develop a kind of passion for practical learning among the students, every year the government of Haryana allocates the budget for the science exhibition in order to enhance innovative teaching learning process.

Science Exhibition & quiz competitions are organized by the departments of science, computer science and geography department. The students also participate in science exhibition at district level, university level and state level in which they got positions.

Educational tours being a part of education are organized for the students and they visit Geographical and Historical sites etc. It provides exposure to the students and enhances their practical knowledge and develops their holistic personality. 4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The College was established in 2005 with limited infrastructure. In a very short span of 15 years it has gradually developed its infrastructure and facilities. It is situated in the prime locality of Jind on a sprawling area of 28123 Sq. mtrs with built up area of 4720Sq. mtrs. The Institution has an administrative block, conference room, sufficient numbers of class rooms and laboratories. There are 35 class rooms. The laboratories are adequate in number. Class rooms and laboratories are well furnished, ventilated and properly lit. Moreover the college has a huge multipurpose hall, a language lab and an EDUSAT room that facilitate greatlearning experience for the students.

Smart Class Rooms:To promote digital learning among the students there are 11 smart class rooms out of 35 which are well equipped with CCTVs, computer panels and white boards with projectors, USB and Wi-Fi access. Students can comprehend the concepts easily by using the multimedia tools. Apart from this, the smooth functioning of the college and to enhance the digitization of work, teaching and administrative departments are also equipped with 19 desktops and printers. There is a lease line of 2 mbps from BSNL.The college campus is fully Wi-Fi.

Computer Labs: For more creative an innovative teaching and digital learning of the students, there are 3 computer labs with 75 computers in working condition. These labs are equipped with printers projectors, speakers and internet.

Language Labs: The college has an air-conditioned English Language Lab with 25 computers, printer cum scanner, projector with white board, speakers and internet facilities. It helps the students in improving their pronunciation and communication skill.

Science Labs: The labs are the backbone of any institution where extensive research and practicals are carried out. Our college has 9 labs with 6 store rooms and a dark room.

Response:

"Apart from education, you need good health, and for that, you need to play sports.", our ever shinning cricket star Kapil Dev has said. Everybody knows a healthy body is the abode of a healthy mind. So keeping in view of the health and interest of the students, our college has developed excellent sports facilities. The college has a 45*20 metres sports ground where Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Lawn Tennis and

Cricket are played. A 200 metres athletic track is shared with the adjacent Govt. Postgraduate College for organizing Annual Athletic Meet. A gymnasium of 10.6*30 suare feet area have been established within the Dept. of Physical Education. The facilities of treadmill, abdominal press, standing cycles, weighing machine, chess and carom boards are available in this room. A sport achievement board is also maintained for the motivation of students. The college has a huge multipurpose hall where indoor gaming events like table tennis, badminton, ball badminton, fencing, boxing, wrestling, yoga and sports classes are held. Thus our college is trying its level best to prove true the Greek physician Hippocrates' words: "Sport is a preserver of health."

In cultural development of the students, our college is on the lead because "culture, in the words of Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru, is widening of the mind and of the spirit." For the cultural development of the students, the college organizes cultural activities under the aegis of cultural committee. And for theorganization of these cultural activities, the college has a fabulous multi-purpose hall with seating capacity of more than 1500 students at a time. P.I.G. Govt. College for Women, Jind Library is in the college main building premises on the First floor. The Library is equipped with ICT facilities. Library is equipped with 150 seating capacity. Library is partial automated with all its subsystems airy reading hall and Wi-Fi. It has facility to access of eresources through open access and also through N-LIST link as the college is a member of N-LIST program of INFLIBNET.

Library at present is using **Software of University Library** 'SOUL version 2.0' a state-of-the-art integrated Library Management Software designed and developed by the INFLIBNET Centre Gandhinagar, Gujarat. This is one of latest Library Management Software incorporating latest technologies that library to serve its users more efficiently. It is easy to operate and requires less programming/computer skills with the pre-requisite of nominal data entry, maximum possible integration of operations and powerful search and query facilities. The major Features and functionalities of SOUL 2.0 are as follows:-

- 1. Browser based access
- 2. Improved user-friendly OPAC interface

- 3. Easing out Import/export of data
- 4. Quick report generation in different formats etc.

Library automation was started with the purchase of desktop and SOUL software version 2.0 in and it started creating database of its holdings. With the up gradation of SOUL and automating other subsystems, Bar-coding of Books was done and Bar-coded Library membership cards were also introduced in 2015. With this the college Library became one of the Govt. College Libraries of Higher Education Department, Haryana which were using barcode technology for circulation.

User Education programmes are also organized from time to time (generally in the starting of every academic session) to make best from these provisions.

Library is looking forward to:

- 1. Setting up of E-Library with the arrangement of sufficient numbers of computer sets in better ration of students.
- 2. Installing RFID system.

Remote accesses to e-resources through N-LIST membership are available to the college staff and students. The College Central Library provides teachers with necessary learning resources for effective delivery of curriculum. All faculty members have been provided with unique user ID and password for accessing NLIST site that offers 80,409 e-Books and 3,828 e- Journals in full text form. Librarian along with computer department faculty helps students in accessing database. User education programme are also done to this effect in the starting of every session.

The institute has also developed its internal mechanism for utilisation and maintenance of the campus. For the task of cleaning and beautification4 and 2 personnels are out-sourced respectively. Moreover, the Govt. has provided manpower on apprentice and under Saksham Yojna. Apart from this, various committees are constituted that invigilate the task of utilisation and maintenance:

All the committees do their task with efficiency. If any item or instrument is to be purchased or got repaired, then quotations are called according to the norms and all the concerned try their best to complete the task in a time-bound manner.

Utilization and Maintenance of Library: It is the knowledge dissemination centre, so it is maintained in an efficient manner. For proper utilization and maintenance of library, the Library Committee headed by the Senior Librarian has been constituted that observes the task of purchasing books, almirahs, furniture, computers, notice-boards etc. Dusting and cleaning is done on regular basis. A library attendant is also available for maintaining discipline and helping students in issuing books.

Utilization and Maintenance of Classrooms: The institute has 35 classrooms including 11 smart rooms. All the classrooms are well lit, ventilated and furnished for smooth functioning of the classes. Fans, tube lights, chairs, boards, benches get repaired by the concerned committee like Property, Smart Class, Electricity, College Building Maintenance and Repair and GEM Purchase committee as and when required.

Utilization and Maintenance of Labs: There are 9 science labs, 3 computer labs and an English language lab. For proper utilization and maintenance of these labs, Lab Augmentation, IT Equipment and Maintenance, and Language Lab Committees have been constituted. These committees do well in their respective areas. Laboratories are cleaned everyday. Repairing and purchasing various equipments, scientific instruments, devices, printers and computers is done as and when required. Computer and language labs are equipped with UPS inverters and Acs that are also subjected to regular maintenance. Lab attendants are also available for smooth functioning of the practical classes. For maintaining the good performance of computers for academic and administrative work, antivirus software has been installed. The Dept. of Computer Science holds the responsibility of overall maintenance and updation of IT infrastructure.

Utilization and Maintenance of Sports Facilities: The institute has developed adequate sports facilities. It has 45*20 mtrs. Sports ground where Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, Lawn Tennis, and Cricket are played. Another playground with 200 mtrs. athletic track is shared with the adjacent PG College for organizing Annual Athletic Meet. A gymnasium of 10.6*30 sq. feet have been established within the Dept. of Physical Education. Multiple hall is used for indoor gaming facilities. For conducting Annual Athletic Meet, every member of the institute contributes his or her best. The Invitation Committee invites eminent personalities for the boost up of the sports persons. A photographer is made available by Photography Committee. Discipline Committee observes discipline during the Meet. Proper seating arrangement is done by the

Seating Arrangement and Tent, Mike and Sound Committees. For procurement of sports material, a Sport Board,headed by the Senior most faculty member of the Dept. of Physical Education, has been constituted. 6.1.2 The effective leadership is visible in various institutional practices such as decentralization and participative management

Response:

Decentralization is having a significant impact on policy, planning and management of higher education. Decentralization is seen as a means of improving the efficiency of education system and the quality of educational services. Principal, Vice Principal, IQAC Members, teaching staff, non-teaching staff, supporting staff, student representatives (CR), Alumini committee, mentor- mentee and various other committees jointly empowered to propose, design, formulate and execute their plans within the frame work of college. The Academic, Administrative, NSS, IQAC all are working together for the smooth running and over all functioning of the college.

College administration is decentralized to ensure the quality and efficiency. The principal of the college, at the helm of all the affairs, has complete autonomy to govern the institution within the preview of the rules and regulations framed by the government. Principal appoints the conveners for various committees with the consent of the council members and further nominates the members of the committees. The Committees carryout the activities and at the end of the academic year, the convener submit the report of the work done to the head of the institution. All these activities are evaluated by the IQAC. All the Committees hold regular meetings with head of the institution (Principal) to review the activities of their Committees. The Committees monitor the execution of the policies. In this way duties and responsibilities are shared and decentralized. Finally all the administrative, academic and financial activities are reviewed by the Principal and Council Members to ensure administrative and academic accountability of the system.

Case Study: Decentralization and Participative management of our institution is best shown in the case study of utilization of grant for Lab Up-gradation

In the session 2018-19, our institution received grant of Rs 1,50,000 from the Office of Department of Higher Education, Panchkula, for the up-gradation of laboratories. A committee was constituted by the Principal for the utilization of grant. The Principal called a meeting of the committee members to discuss the matter and directed them to receive requirement of grant from different departments like Science, Geography and Computers. As per the requirement submitted by different departments, the amount was allocated to them. Then the whole grant was utilised and bills were submitted in the office. After that, the College Bursar examined and scrutinized the bills thoroughly. At the end, the bills were signed by the Principal, who is the sole authority of the institution having power of DDO (Drawing and

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, etc.

Response:

The college has a democratic set up where each unit is given full freedom to work out its innovative plans for development. The hierarchical order is maintained and there is internal coordination and harmony among the various units of the college. The academic goals are set through collaborative efforts of the various components of the institution. Then responsibilities are assigned to the departments and their individual teachers. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

- 4. Under CSR rules, compensatory leave is given to teaching staff in lieu of work done during holidays.
- 5. Casual leaves, Child Care Leaves for 2 years, Maternity Leave and medical leaves are given as per Haryana Government policy.
- 6. Employee Provident Fund for teaching staff.

- 7. Annual and PhD Increments are given as per policy.
- 8. Education allowance facility is also available for teaching staff as per the rules of Haryana Govt.
- 9. Medical Reimbursement facility is available for staff under the guidelines of Haryana Government
- 10. Faculty appointments prior to 2004 are eligible for pension benefits on Retirement.
- 11. Gratuity Scheme and GIS (Group Insurance Scheme) are available for teaching staff.
- 12. Various kind of loans are also provided to teaching staff according to the rules of Government of Haryana.
- 13.LTC in terms of one salary is provided in one block of three years.

For Non -Teaching Staff:

6.3.5 Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Haryana Govt. has introduced Performance Appraisal System (PAS) for teaching and non-teaching staff in the Govt. colleges and universities as per UGC guidelines. All faculty members fill prescribed Performa for self-appraisal. PAS system encourages the faculty members to make excellent performance in teaching —learning and research. The institution has performance based appraisal system for the Assessment of teaching and non-teaching staff.

Teaching staff:

The API (Appraisal Performance Index) of the teaching staff is on the basis of their academic, research and other extra-curricular activities. It is also based upon his/her relation with the students, colleagues and administration. The performance appraisal report is to be filled by the teaching staff in a given prescribed Performa which includes three main categories i.e. Category one contains Teaching, Learning and Evaluation-related activities. Category two contains Co-curricular, Extension and Professional Development related activities. And Category three is mainly focused on Research and Academic contributions. The PBAS Performa is the primary means of assessing a faculty member for the purpose of promotion under Career Advancement Schemes (CAS) and awards. The Performance Appraisal Reports (PBAs) provide good feedback to faculty. The overall report is further reviewed by the Principal and the Convener of IQAC and final performance functioning status is setup and confidentially recorded in the office.

Secondly, ACR (Annual Confidential Reports) are filed by each and every teaching staff.

Non-teaching staff:-

Every non-teaching staff member is assessed for his/her performance according to his/her works, duties and responsibilities assigned by the principal. ACR (Annual Confidential Reports) are filed by every non-teaching staff and according to his/her work, grading are assigned by the Principal. The systematic procedure has helped the principal to motivate the employees for better performance.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Institution conducts external financial audits regularly as per government rules after every five to seven years. In our college financial external audit was done for the time period 2011 -2016. Chief Accounts Officer, Government of Haryana conducts financial audit on submission of financial statements and provides the audit report. Funds received from government agencies like Social Welfare Departments towards SC, ST, OBC and other minority scholarships are audited. In our college fees received from students is bifurcated into various types of funds like A.F., University Fund, Red Cross Fund, R.K. Fund etc. For these funds different cash-books and stock registers are maintained. Auditor thoroughly inspects such books and further verifies that the balance as per cash book and balance as per pass-book is reconciled or not.

The institution maintains transparency in all its financial transactions like collection of fees, payments of salaries, payments of bills to the vendors etc. which are done through banks. Auditor checks the utilization of all the grants sanctioned to Placement Cell, Women Cell, Earn While You Learn, Lab Up-gradation, Material and Supply and Office Expenses (O/E).

Internal Audit mechanism is ongoing continuous process to check and verify all vouchers of transactions with reference to sanctioned budget. After getting the requirements from different departments and subsequent approval of the Principal, the purchase committee purchases the items as per the laid down procedure and rules. The Convener of purchase committee along with the Bursar of the college keeps a strict vigil on the purchase system. In our college Bursar performs the duty of internal auditor. Cash Books are regularly filled and verified by Principal and Bursar.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The College has a proper system for effective and optimal use of available financial resources. The key decisions related to finance and related matters are taken by Bursar, who constantly monitor and encourage the proper utilization of allocated funds. As per The Higher Education Department of Haryana, Funds are allocated in different heads like EWYL, material and supply, lab up-gradation, sports grant, NSS Grant, Women cell, counseling and placement cell for optimum utilization. The procedure for purchasing materials, first of all survey of market is conducted, then quotations are invited from different suppliers and rates are compared. Finally, the lowest possible rate with best quality material is selected. The mode of payment is done either by cheque or by internet banking. Under the scheme of 'Earn While You Learn' run by Haryana Govt. hard working meritorious and poor students are selected from various streams to provide their services in Labs, Library and office for which they are paid accordingly at an hourly rate. Various labs like science, geography, computer science and English are upgraded every year with modern equipments. Under sports grant, sports equipments are purchased and annual athletic meet of college is also organized.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes

Response:

The Institute has formed IQAC in 2013. Quality assurance is a dynamic process and IQAC has contributed significantly in developing quality consciousness in the entire college. It has brought about positive changes in functioning of the college by setting benchmarks for quality. Every aspect of academic as well as administrative role of college has been impacted. There has been a positive shift in the management strategy and thinking process. The IQAC is constituted by the Institute comprising the members from both Internal and External sources. The external members make significant contributions in the major decisions

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by giving suggestion pertaining to policy making, revision of college norms, student development schemes, infrastructure development, research, etc.

The two examples of practices institutionalized as a result of IQAC initiatives are given as under:

1. Mentor-Mentee Groups

The college has perused the mentor-mentee group to increase the interaction between teacher and students (mentor and mentees), so that they develop a smooth communication practice on an emotional plane for making teaching- learning process effective and efficient. The aim of mentor-mentee group is to develop, maintain, and improve the student's performance and promote a co-operative learning environment. It helps in bridging the gap between the theory and practice. Each mentor keeps a complete record of students allotted to them. The mentor remains in touch with the students regularly. There is a provision of one period of mentoring in the college timetable, where the mentors interact with the mentees and resolve their problems and grievances at their level or bring the same to the notice of the authority. Mentors try to assess both meritorious and weak students and provide them suitable guidance. The group is intended to facilitate the participation of mentors and mentees and enable them to explore the great opportunities created when two personalities collide.

2. Green Environment

In the meeting of IQAC dated 02.07.2015, it was discussed about the green environment for the college campus. It was decided to increase the plantation in the college. Result of which, today we are having the lush green campus. A large number of ornamental and seasonal plants are planted as per the requirement and availability of resources. The students use bags made up of biodegradable material mainly made up of fibers. Beautification of Botanical garden is done on regular basis.

7.1 Institutional Values and Social Responsibilities

7.1.1 Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the last five years.

Response:

The College is proactive in fostering a gender sensitive, gender equal and safe environment for all its members. College ensures strict compliance with laws related to gender equality, ragging, discriminatory behavior, and harassment. Students are encouraged to learn self defense methods and promote social awareness and women safety by organizing seminars and programmes for the subject of harassment

Safety and Security: The campus has a 24 x 7 security system and enforcement of discipline and student safety is under direct purview of the Principal office, which coordinates through installation of CCTV cameras at the entry and various places in campus. Entry into the campus is restricted and allowed after proper verification. Regular patrolling by police vehicles and presence of women and male police personnel at main entry/ exit gate is ensured. The collaboration of Police is sought through deployment of anti-eve-teasing team/ Durga vahini wing of police for the safety of girl students. Foot patrolling by deputed staff on proctorial duty and members of discipline committee is undertaken to foster security among students. There is zero tolerance against eve teasing/ragging with wide publicity. Self defence training programmes are organised by women cell in collaboration with Police and Govt. Training agencies. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited in the campus and is strictly observed by Anti-ragging committee. The Women Cell organizes regular workshops, gender sensitive theatre, women centric self defence training. It undertakes extension activities for promoting gender awareness and sensitization.

Counselling: A central counselling cell is functional at Women Cell. Departments are also mandated to have regular student-faculty interaction meetings to take stock of problems/issues and resolve them. They are freely approachable and proactively counsel students for academic growth, job opportunities and all other important matters.

Common Room: The College has appropriate facility for students' lounge/common room in room no 108. Besides 7 washrooms are there for female students out of which 4 are equipped with incinerators and a vending machine is also installed in the college. Further general medicines are available in Health Centre of the college.

Day Care Center for young children: There is no such facility available in the campus.

Besides the abovementioned facilities available in the campus, special measures have been initiated by higher education department for the promotion of gender equality and sensitization.

The detail of various activities like seminars, workshops, competitions, extension lectures, camps etc. is released by higher education department time to time. The activities are conducted under various cells like women cell, legal literacy cell, Youth voter's club, Red Ribbon Club, NSS.

- A complaint box is also placed in the college campus.
- Various lectures by the experts, workshops, competitions are organized by women cell, legal cell, NSS, Red Ribbon club etc. to aware the students about their personal and social issues.

Every policy is implemented under the supervision of DGHE. Even the maintenance of the building is under PWD department. If the government takes the initiative of introducing some PG courses and vocational courses it will be highly beneficial for the girls to groom their holistic development. Sometimes the government assigned the extra duties to the teachers as a result of which the teaching is affected.

Concluding Remarks:

The college is a boon for the girls of district Jind as it is situated at the prime location near bus stand easily approachable for the girls of rural vicinity. It provides excellent ambience and infrastructure to the girls students of this region. This college is the first preference of the parents of this district as it is safe & secure equipped with lush green environment, labs (computer, physics, botany, zoology, geography) multipurpose hall and sports facilities. The college offers 9 courses B.A., B.A. English Honours, B.A. Geography Honours, B.Com, B.Com Honours, BSc .non medical, BSc. medical, BSc. computer science, BCA. The government is taking initiative to provide bus service to the girls by organizing special routes for the girls of rural areas. The college and the government are taking initiatives to groom the holistic personality of the students. Physical, intellectual, economic and spiritual growth of the girls is the vision and mission of the college and the government. In the future college plans to provide the girls hostel facility also. The college is also going to open a research centre in library for the students and the students to promote research. To conclude we can say that the college is equipped with good infrastructure but there is a great need to groom the intellectual and economic capability of the students.
